### Rabbi's Report

My Dear Friends,

This is the tenth time I have submitted my annual report to the members of Temple Beth Or. As I approach my tenth anniversary as your rabbi, I share with you my deep feeling of blessing at how fortunate I have been to be with such a supportive, caring and involved community. We can never know what the future will bring, of course, but when I think of where I could have been in my life and career, I can say with certainty that there is no better congregation, large or small, than Temple Beth Or in Montgomery.

Usually these annual reports follow a certain model, recounting high points of the year and anticipating the next. Until my illness was diagnosed in mid-March, my year followed the usual busy trajectory. We piloted the new Reform High Holy Day prayer book, *Mishkan Hanefesh*, along with some fairly significant changes in our music, and this year will be adopting the new book that I consider to be a magnificent achievement of the Reform Movement. We introduced new forms of music and worship for many of our Shabbat services, thanks in large measure to our soloists Turia Stark Williams and Pete Hitchcock, and our new music director, Becky Taylor, and some new singers – consummate professionals making up the finest ensemble we have in Montgomery.

I love to teach and was pleased that my Tuesday classes were so well attended. Usually about half the class consisted of members, with a regular cadre of participants from the larger community, as we studied the High Holy Days, Chanukah, the prophets, ethical and

social dilemmas in Jewish life, Jewish humor and other topics.

I continued to represent our Jewish community in wider forums, including classes at Kiwanis, the Masonic Lodge, Interfaith Montgomery, and a number of classes, forums or programs at various churches in town. We also welcomed visiting groups: This was the 40<sup>th</sup> year, I think, that the Montgomery Academy sent over about 80 First Graders to learn about Chanukah, and I also welcomed a Cub Scout troop, several church groups, and over 200 students who joined us on Huntingdon College night. We hosted about ten different groups visiting on Civil Rights tours, with a couple of which we had excellent exchanges over joint dinners. This was the first year when a group of us convened at a Chinese restaurant for dinner on Christmas, following an old Jewish tradition, and of course our year included wonderful events on Sukkot, Simchat Torah, Chanukah, Purim, Passover and others.

All of this would simply not have been possible without our dedicated leadership – in Sisterhood under Susan Finklestein's leadership and the Men's Club now under Pete Hitchcock's leadership – and Gina and Marlon who run a tight ship that accomplishes far more with limited resources than anyone can imagine, and our supremely dedicated officers and Board who always go above and beyond in meeting the needs of our members with sensitivity and great personal care.

The real work of a rabbi, however – and the real blessing of being a rabbi, I might add – is not in the public presentations, important as these are, but in the private moments we are privileged to share with those going through major life transitions. Working with people on a wedding, baby-naming, conversion or funeral – or providing some counsel for those going

through a crisis – brings a rabbi close to an individual or family in a way that doctors and lawyers and business folk can rarely experience. My relationships with many of our members has deepened over time, and even a seemingly simple involvement such as standing with one of you before the ark to say a prayer, or a home visit, can have profound significance. The real joy of being a rabbi is not in the speaking or teaching, but in these moments of blessing.

The question sometimes arises: Who cares for the caregiver? In January Sandy Lynn was diagnosed with a lymphoma – treatable with radiation and hopefully curable – and the question came closer to home. In Mid-March, right after Huntingdon College night, I was diagnosed with an aggressive pancreatic cancer, and I was laid low by the cancer itself, and especially by the side effects of chemotherapy that quickly changed my role to that of care-receiver.

And receive that support I have. In these recent weeks Sandy Lynn and I have been overwhelmed by the love, support, prayers and care we have received. We have been in prayer lists at churches around town, and literally dozens of our members have offered rides or meals or other levels of support. You cannot imagine what it feels like to receive a video on my phone at 7:05 p.m. on a Shabbat evening, with everyone gathered for Kiddush and Motzi, and the video has our members calling out Shabbat shalom. Talk about a moment of blessing!

As I begin to recover some strength I hope to return soon to start attending, working again with our bar and bat mitzvah students, and in due course get past this medical leave and continue to serve in all the ways a rabbi is expected to do. I am grateful to all those who

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I begin with words of thanks and gratitude, the author of which is unknown . . .

These words struck me as being extraordinarily timely and pertinent to us at Temple Beth Or. We are grateful that our Rabbi is here with us tonight. We are thankful for all of our members who have stepped forward to lead you in worship and prayer, many doing so for the first time ever. But we do have more to do and it is not always going to be easy.

In my first bulletin article in August, I reflected on change, just as I had done when I became president in 1994. I further shared the importance of not just

being a member and paying your dues but making an effort to participate in Shabbat worship. Throughout the year, I continued to emphasize this same message but I am not satisfied that my message was heard. We all can do better.

We have experienced some very important changes. We used the pilot editions of the new High Holy Day prayer books for most of the holy day services and we have now purchased 175 sets of Mishkan Hanefesh which we will be using this Fall. We began the year with a professional choir consisting of many new and some old voices and with Becky Taylor as its director. Equally, we have and will continue to enjoy Turia Stark Williams and Pete Hitchcock as they lead us in song from the Bimah.

We have installed a camera security system for the exterior of the building which records all movement 24 hours a day. We have recently had the Police Department conduct a voluntary security assessment and there are a few additional items that we need to address that will enhance our system and the security of the building.

We are going to be upgrading the playground thanks in large part to the generous consideration of the Hart family to use the funds in the Carol Hart Fund toward this endeavor. Hopefully this will be completed before the Religion School reconvenes in the Fall.

Our Food Festival was again a resounding success and a special thanks to the committee for its diligence in making this event a wonderful experience, both for the congregation and the community at large. I know that plans are already in the making for next year's event.

Special gratitude for the officers and trustees that have served you so well and I would be remiss if I didn't single out our Sisterhood for all that it does throughout the year, from receptions and dinners to anything it is asked to do. And last but by far not least, a sincere thank you to Gina Friday and Marlon Cotton for their support for this

Temple. It is unimaginable where we would be without them.

And now, a few words about Rabbi Stevens. I cannot begin to tell you how wonderful an experience it has been for me to work so closely with him. Never have I had an opportunity to be associated with anyone who is so well prepared and also thinking one, maybe two, steps ahead. When his illness became public, the number of people who reached out and offered support was amazing and we all wish him and Sandy Lynn the very best as they both continue their paths to better health.

One of the people who did reach out was Rabbi Jonathan Miller who, after almost 28 years, is retiring from Temple Emanuel in Birmingham. Rabbi Miller called me and offered to come to Montgomery in September and lead our congregation in High Holy Day worship. His offer has been graciously accepted.

Tonight we approved a budget for the coming year that will require for the first time using corpus from the Kahl Montgomery Endowment Fund to be able to cover our expenses and balance the budget. We have not had a dues modification in more years than I can remember and this may need to be addressed in the months ahead. I certainly encourage anyone who so desires to voluntarily increase their dues.

I end in much the same way as I did at the annual meeting 22 years ago. I am not so foolish to think that everything about the Temple will be exactly like everyone wants it to be. But I am committed to doing everything I can to work within the congregation to make it the very best for all its members. I cannot do it alone and we can succeed by a willingness to work together to insure that Temple Beth Or can be the "house of light" for all.




