A VIEW FROM THE PULPIT

The Talmud reports a story about Rabbi Akiba, who lived about 1,900 years ago.

"Once Rabbi Eliezer came before the ark and recited the 24 blessings said on fast days, as a plea for rain, but his prayer was not answered. Rabbi Akiba then came before the ark and exclaimed, 'Our Father, our King, we have no king but you; our Father, our King, have mercy upon us, for Your own sake!' whereupon the rain fell."

When Rabbi Akiba composed this beloved prayer, Avinu Malkeinu, he undoubtedly didn't realize that the prayer would become one of the central and enduring parts of our liturgy on the High Holy Days. Individual lines in the prayer have changed over the years – our Reform version strangely omits the line 'we have no King but You" – but the concluding lines are universally the same: "our Father, our King, be gracious and answer us, for we have little merit. Treat us generously and with kindness, and be our help."

Akiba, pleading "we have little merit," threw himself on God's mercy, and we do the same; we pray "Aseh imanu tzedakah va'chesed, v'hoshi-einu," "Grant us, God, righteousness and mercy – not because we deserve it but only because You are You and we are what we are: Help us!

The High Holy Days are now upon us, and I am intrigued at the notion of being "saved" in Judaism. Jewish communities of Western Europe in the 19th century thought they would be saved by modernity and the Enlightenment. They became bona fide citizens, entered universities and professions, worked hard and fought patriotically in Europe's wars – and discovered in Germany that their patriotism and their Nobel Prizes did not save them. In this country we carried the banner of liberalism and human decency, and emphasized our common heritage as part of a "Jewish-Christian" tradition, downplaying our peoplehood – yet tens of millions in this country think of ours as a Christian nation, and tolerate Jews only as part of God's eventual plan to return the Messiah. We American Jews are also at utter odds with much of the Third World's embrace of terrorism as an instrument for revolutionary change – including a rabid anti-Israel bias that unceasingly calls for Israel's destruction. And the voices of Holocaust-deniers will not be stilled. No, we seem to have little merit. Ein banu ma'asim. Our credentials are used up.

The message of Yom Kippur is that when all else fails, God remains. Being Jewish and behaving like a Jew remains. Doing mitzvoth remains. We have no need to apologize for being alive, for being Jews, or for ordering our lives on the abiding foundations of Jewish living.

The Avinu Malkeinu ends, "Asei imanu tzedaka va'chesed...v'hoshieinu." Imanu. "Do justice and mercy with us, and save us." "With us." The prayer teaches us that we are God's partners. If we want God to do justice and act with mercy, then that's what we must do. We must not give up on repairing the world, nor must we give up on learning about Judaism and grounding our lives in Jewish principles and action. This Yom Kippur, let us return not just to a renewed commitment to live righteously, but to return to Judaism as a core commitment of our lives.



SHARING WITH THOSE IN NEED --TZEDAKAH GIFTS FOR THE HOLY DAYS

As a caring community, and in keeping with Reform Judaism's generations-long emphasis on social justice and repairing our damaged world, our Social Concerns Committee (Louisa Weinrib, chair) has selected five agencies suggested for us to support during these High Holy Days.

This year, as you enter the sanctuary for evening services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, you will find an envelope in your prayer book pre-addressed to Temple Beth Or, along with a card listing five opportunities for giving. You will be asked to take these home and consider making a generous donation to the agency of your choice. If you check off more than one agency, your gift will be divided; undesignated checks will be divided proportionately based on the balances raised. The agencies are:

AID TO INMATE MOTHERS: provides books and tapes for women in prison to read bedtime stories to their children left at home.

MONTGOMERY AIDS OUTREACH: provides medical care for poor HIV/AIDS patients in 23 counties, and prevention education for ages 5-seniors.

MONTGOMERY AREA FOOD BANK: serves 25 counties through feeding programs of established charities and churches and mobile pantries.

FAMILY SUNSHINE CENTER: serves the needs of victims of domestic abuse.

CENTRAL ALABAMA LAUBACH LITERACY COUNCIL provides assistance free to adult learners to improve their basic reading, writing and spelling skills.

NEW SOCIAL CONCERNS PROJECT: Bedtime Bundles

During the months of November and December, the Board and the Social Concerns Committee are inviting all members to participate in making Bedtime Bundles for the child victims of sex abuse handled by Child Protect.

Located in Mike Weinrib's former medical office on South Perry Street, Child Protect's region is Montgomery, Autauga, Elmore and Chilton Counties. Last year they interviewed 451 children, mostly girls between the ages of 6 and 12 years, and 98 per cent of them concerned allegations of sex abuse. Immediately on entering the building the staff gives each child a teddy bear to have and to hug.

After coming to Child Protect, these children go into foster care, and, according to Director Jannah Bailey, they have nothing to call their own, so they will be thrilled to have one of these Bedtime Bundles.

Temple members are to buy new pillow cases which will appeal to children (race-neutral, please), and into them put all new items: toothbrush, toothpaste, pajamas, underpants, socks, small stuffed animal, storybook, etc. The pillow cases should be tied with shoelaces, and labeled with a note that says for what age group and gender the Bundle is appropriate. There will be more details in the TBO November Bulletin.

We think that families will enjoy shopping together for items to go into the Bedtime Bundles. If anyone does not want to compile an entire Bundle, or wants to contribute money for this purpose, L'Chaim League will put together partial bundles or do the shopping necessary. Please feel free to go that route. There will be a crib set up in the lobby to receive and display the Bundles. We hope we can make this an ongoing project, or at least an annual Holiday mitzvah for the Temple community.
