A VIEW FROM THE BIMAH



Samuel Coleridge's famous poem, "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner," contains these lines:

"All in a hot and copper sky, The bloody Sun, at noon, Right up above the mast did stand, No bigger than the Moon.

Day after day, day after day, We stuck, nor breath nor motion; As idle as a painted ship Upon a painted ocean."

The ancient mariner must have been in the doldrums. "Doldrums" is a nautical term for areas of the world's oceans on either side of the equator, where the prevailing winds are calm – the so-called intertropical convergence zone. The doldrums' low pressure is caused by the heat at the equator; for sailing ships, the doldrums are notorious for trapping ships for days or even weeks without enough wind to power their sails.

Feels a bit like Montgomery in summer, doesn't it?

When the heat and humidity engage in their daily competition to see which can hit 100 first, it becomes quite a challenge for us to generate enough wind in our sails to accomplish much. And so "doldrums" has also come to mean a spell of listlessness, inactivity and stagnation.

But, for many of us, summer doldrums has come to mean a time for recharging our batteries. Many of us take our vacations in summer – perhaps from the habit of having children off from school, or just to escape the heat here in the South – where we seek a change of pace and/or scenery. We use this period to shrug off the pressures of work or a too-crowded social schedule. If we do it right it can actually lead toward a renewal.

What would a summer of renewal look like? The possibilities are endless. Take a class? Read something in an area you don't normally read? Visit new places, and/or make new relationships? Try your hand at a sport, or craft activity? Write the Great American Novel? Whether this past year has been one of achievement and satisfaction, or challenge

and loss, nothing beats going down a new and different path to open new horizons and goals.

Taken seriously, this renewal and turning in new directions has the potential to be spiritually transforming, and the experience can be deeply spiritual.

This renewal has a counterpart in Judaism. The Hebrew term is *teshuvah*, which means "turning in a new direction." *Teshuvah* is a central theme of the High Holy Days, which fortuitously follows right after the summer doldrums; *Teshuvah* is more commonly translated "repentance."

One more thing may be said about doldrums. The equatorial area of doldrums is, paradoxically, the area from which tropical waves become storms and, possibly, hurricanes. Even the doldrums have huge generative possibilities, and the same can be true for us. But even without the analogy to hurricanes, the hard work of doing *teshuvah* during the Holy Days – turning ourselves in new directions for a new year of hope, challenge and satisfaction – can only benefit by starting the process now, even as summer is just getting under way, and making the best of it for ourselves and our families. We don't need to get stuck in the doldrums.

Volunteer Opportunity




