What an extraordinary privilege it was last month to hear Mona Golaback's concert

performance in our

Social Hall, dramatizing her mother's odyssey escaping Nazi Germany on the Kindertransport through London during the Blitz, and her pursuit of her own career as a concert pianist. With nearly 150 in attendance, the evening was inspiring. Our piano never had such a workout, and the program was truly world class.

What transformed the evening from a wonderful dramatic performance into a moment of transcendence were the personal stories Mona shared with us. How fortunate her family is to *have* such stories! How sad when a family doesn't pass their stories down from generation to generation, or wait until it's too late for the next generation to learn more about who we are and what we've learned and experienced.

My own experience these recent weeks highlighted how important our family stories are. Sandy Lynn and I drove to Ellenville, NY – in the lower Catskills, about 2 ½ hours north of New York

City – to help Sandy Lynn's 91-year-old mother pack up her house for her move to Montgomery.

Aside from the physical labor and the joy of finally learning how those strapping tape things are supposed to work, we found bags and boxes filled with many hundreds of old photographs. Some of these clearly went back more than a century, and in many cases all memory had been lost of who these people were. Their stories had completely disappeared. Whether or not to move a piece of furniture or a particular set of dishes turned out not to be very important; but the photos were all packed, lovingly, but with sadness that the stories of those who were no longer with us would never be told.

On the way north we had first stopped in Washington (Silver Spring, actually), where we stayed a few days with our son Daniel and his family, including our one-year-old grandson Noah, just turned one. Noah has a shot at living into the 22nd century. Still being on a high from the concert and the wonderfully told stories we heard at Temple, I wondered what stories Noah will learn, and what he will know of his grandparents. We, too, took

many pictures, but with today's technology most of these will never be printed, and labels these days, for the most part, reside in a computer hard drive that almost certainly won't be readable a generation from now.

Here's what I'm thinking. We (collectively) need to tell our stories. They are precious. Some of us spend extensive time in genealogical research – but these aren't our stories. Twitters and Facebook and blogs have some potential, but these, too, are easily lost. Diaries and journals and poems are better, but in terms of making connections across the generations, nothing beats the oral tradition of just opening up, asking questions, and sharing the stories we somehow rarely have time to share.

In Judaism, our recollection of those who have gone is traditionally accompanied by the phrase, *zichronam livracha*, "may their memories be for a blessing." Learning our family stories and retelling them is surely a way to bless and be blessed, as we continue the links in our family chain, from generation to generation.

FROM THE LIBRARY

We've recently received three gift books to the library that we'll profile for August:

An Introduction to Islam for Jews by **Reuven Firestone:** Rachel Simon of Princeton University wrote in the AJL (Association of Jewish Libraries) *Newsletter*, "(t)his book provides the Jewish reader with a valuable tool: a readable, comprehensive, and reliable introduction to Islam with special attention to issues relevant to Jews regarding past and present events and attitudes ... This authoritative and readable book is of value for students and general readers alike." The Multicultural Review stated, ""In the post 9/11 world, a text that explains the historical background and fundamental tenets of Islam in a readable and detailed way is sorely needed. An Introduction to Islam for Jews succeeds admirably in fulfilling this need." Treasures From the Attic: The Extraordinary Story of Anne Frank's Family by Mirjam Pressler; When Helen Frank Elias (sister to Otto Frank and aunt to Anne) died, the house she had lived in passed to her son, Buddy. In 2001, the family makes a startling discovering in the attic -- a treasure trove of family documents and artifacts (over 6,000 in all) that shines new light book comes to the temple library by way of Montgomery native Barry David Marcus whose family were members of Temple Beth Or for generations. Marcus now lives in New York City as a professional photographer and shot the cover art for Treasures From the Attic. This book is given to the library in memory of Barbara Marcus, his mother. The Children of Willesden Lane: Beyond Kindertransport: A Memoir of Music, Love, and Survival by Mona Golabek and Lee Cohen: Golabek is a Grammy-nominated concert pianist who recently visited Montgomery as part of her national tour performing a onewoman monologue and concert show based on this book. Publishers Weekly provides this assessment: "One of 10,000 Jewish children sent to England by fearful parents at the dawn of WWII, aspiring pianist Lisa Jura was 14 when her family put her on a Kindertransport train in Vienna. In this alternately heartwrenching and uplifting story, Jura's daughter, Golabek, a pianist, and writer Cohen trace the six years Jura spent in London, where she found surrogate families in the 31 other young refugees at the Willesden Lane hostel, and in the working-class British women at the East End garment factory that employed her. The authors beautifully capture Jura's passion for music and her determination to realize her dream of becoming a concert pianist. Her quest to win a scholarship to the Royal Academy of Music seems to inject hope into everyone with whom she comes into contact: the hostel owner provides her with a piano and practice time, her housemate's band together to drill her on technique and theory, and a coworker makes her an audition outfit. Yet this is no *Babes in Arms*. Jura's struggle to hold herself together on the trip to England and as she makes a life for herself without the guidance of her beloved mother is as bleak as her musical successes are joyful. The war may be over, but for her and her fellow young refugees waiting to learn the fate of their families, the tragedy will continue."
