A VIEW FROM THE BIMAH

I write this having just returned from what could well have been the largest Jewish assembly ever – the Biennial convention of

the Union for Reform Judaism [URJ]. With nearly 6,000 Jewish leaders from throughout North America, Israel and elsewhere, the convention attested to the health, excitement and vitality that characterizes today's Reform. Reform Judaism is now by far the largest expression of Judaism, and is also the largest liberal religious movement of any denomination in North America.

One cannot imagine how validating and inspiring it is to worship and sing with more than 5,000 fellow Reform Jews; or to attend a Shabbat dinner with that same number singing the songs in one voice; or to attend some of literally hundreds of sessions covering every academic and practical field imaginable, and realize by the absolute wealth of offerings emanating from our Movement that Reform is not only thriving, but continuing to energize and lead the Jewish world.

I use the word "lead" advisedly. We celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Religious Action Center, a unique Jewish institution in which we should all take great pride. Both the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 were written in their conference room. The Soviet Jewry movement was largely born there, and the National Conference of Soviet Jewry was housed at the RAC in their early days. America's concern with Darfur: with equal rights for women – and gays and lesbians and workers and just about anyone else who has been downtrodden or oppressed – was fostered and led by the RAC as much as by any other organization; the RAC, together with Martin Luther King, Jr. and other black leaders, organized the March on

Washington. Indeed President Barak Obama, in speaking to our convention, said that without Reform Judaism's Religious Action Center, he probably would not have been standing there as president.

I have heard some of our members decry the social action focus of our Movement as too politicized, or too liberal, or even as antithetical to their sense of what the term "religion" signifies. My own feeling is the opposite – that the work of the RAC and Reform Judaism itself carry on the prophetic tradition as no one else does, and must continue to do so as part of our very raison d'etre.

President Obama's address was electrifying, especially when he recognized the NFTY contingent and hundreds of our leading Reform Jewish youth screamed in unison. After giving a wonderful D'var Torah including appropriate (and well pronounced) Hebrew references, the president spoke of America's relationship with Israel.

President Obama stated his strong support for a two-state solution – a strong, secure Israel, and an independent Palestine. He is frustrated at the state of the peace process, but averred that peace and the process toward peace cannot be imposed; they must be negotiated by the parties. He said "My vision begins with a strong, secure state of Israel; we share bonds of values and interests, and stand with Israel as a Jewish democratic state. Ehud Barak, Israel's defense minister, also spoke to our conference, and said much the same thing, saying "that no administration has done more for Israeli security than this one." Both Ehud Barak and Barak Obama pointed out that under this administration, the United States has provided more funding than any other in history, including an advanced missile defense system. Obama also noted that his administration has forged alliances that

have led to the hardest hitting sanctions Iran has ever faced. In pointing to other examples, he said that his administration saw to the dispatch of fire-fighting units to fight the fires around Haifa, and also saw to the security of Israelis in Cairo during riots around the Israeli Embassy there in the midst of the Egyptian revolution. "The United States has defended Israel in forums around the world," he said, and the Israeli defense minister noted the many vetoes taken by the U.S. before the United Nations. To be sure, some of President Obama's remarks seemed like boiler-plate campaign rhetoric – but I found the content to be cogent, credible and comforting.

I will be reporting on other aspects of the convention in other ways, to our congregation and our Board, in coming days. I look forward in particular to sharing some programs and insights I learned in the workshops I attended, in particular in such areas as website management, streaming video of worship services, and other practical areas of interest – including one program that shared the "cohabitation" experiences of several congregations that had learned to live with each other.

My only disappointment is that I was alone in representing our congregation. Even the Reform congregation in Dothan, a third our size, sent four delegates. I do believe that there is a relationship between the strength of our own community and our awareness of and participation in the larger world of Reform Judaism. I unhesitatingly encourage each of you to consider joining me at the next Biennial, set for mid-December, 2013 in San Diego.

We'll be highlighting a number of titles in forthcoming bulletins, but here is a taste of what we have received:

For the genealogist: The Encyclopedia of Jewish Genealogy, Volume I: Sources in the United States and Canada, From Generation to Generation: How to Trace Your Jewish Genealogy and

Family History by Arthur Kurzweil, Avotaynu Guide to Jewish
Genealogy edited by Sallyann
Amdur and Sack & Gary Mokotoff,
How to Trace Your Jewish Roots by
Rabbi Jo David, Google Your Family
Tree: Unlock the Hidden Power of
Google by Daniel M. Lynch, and
Getting Started in Jewish Genealogy
(2011 edition) by Gary Mokotoff.

In the arts we've purchased *The Human Figure and Jewish Culture* by Eliane Strosberg, and *Lost Lives*, *Lost Art: Jewish Collectors, Nazi Art Theft, and the Quest for Justice* by Melissa Muller, Monkia Tatzkow, and Ronald S. Lauder.

Novels include *Pictures at an Exhibition* by Sara Houghteling, set in Paris during World War II; *Threads and Flames* by Esther Friesner, set in New York at the time of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire; and *Displaced Persons* by Ghita Schwarz, a debut novel set in the aftermath of World War II with a protagonist who, recently liberated from a concentration camp, must now rebuild his life.

For history buffs we have *The Witness House: Nazis and Holocaust Survivors Sharing a Villa During the Nuremberg Trials* by Christiane Kohl, *Operation Exodus: From the Nazi Death Camps to the Promised Land: A Perilous Journey that Shaped Israel's Fate* by Gordon Thomas, and *Peace in the Making: The Menachem Begin – Anwar El-Sadat Personal Correspondence* edited by Harry Hurwitz and Yisrael Medad.

And lastly, for younger readers we have *Remarkable Park* by Bracha Goetz, a picture book about two

Jewish children who discover numerous animal friends at *Remarkable Park* (ages 4-6); and the first four titles in the Boy Sherlock Holmes series by Shane Peacock – *Eye of the Crow, Death in the Air, Vanishing Girl*, and *The Secret Fiend* (ages 10 and up), and *The Song of the Whales* by Uri Orlev (winner of the Hans Christian Andersen Medal in 1996) about a boy who moves to Israel where he learns from him grandfather an amazing and magical secret.

SHALIACH NEWS

On December 1st 1955 Rosa Parks refused to leave her bus seat in order to make room for a white passenger. Unknowingly, Park's act of defiance (and the harsh arrest that followed) ignited a struggle that ended racial segregation in America.

Since then, the world has changed and progressed, but lately it looks like the world is taking a few steps backwards. All around the world we see religious extremists fighting freedom and liberalism and trying to take us back to different darker days. And while it happens with every religion, it happens also in the Jewish world, and in the Jewish state of Israel.

The next Rosa Parks will need to get on a bus in *Mea'a Shearim* or any other Ultra-Orthodox neighborhood in every city in Israel, sit in the front part of the bus and face the driver telling her she is not going anywhere. Not because she is African-American, only because she is a woman.

During the past few years, Ultra-Orthodox communities in Israel are keeping men and women fully separated. What started as a separation in synagogues -- while praying and wearing modest clothes – spread to a situation in which women are being pushed out of public space and the public eye.

A man and a woman won't be seen together; it doesn't matter if they are married or brother and sister. The voice of singing women is forbidden and even young girls can't dance in an official ceremony due to anxiety. I guess that in their eyes, kids are not identified as pure and innocent as they need to be.

Big parts of the Israeli public, some of them even from the Ultra-Orthodox community, are protesting against this phenomenon that may have started by trying to keep modesty but became an acceptance of an animal urge.

Isn't the claim that a man can't control himself and concentrate while being surrounded by women admitting defeat? Are these men following a *Mitzvah* or have they just stopped using their brains and started acting like any other animal? Is it the time for an Orthodox Rosa Parks or has this whole situation maybe got out of proportion? Should we let every person live according to his own beliefs even if they clash with the basic values of democracy and pluralism that we defend so boldly? Can we tell a community how to act, even if they all believe it should be done differently? And last, is it our business to fix how they live even when it doesn't hurt us?

The problem starts in the public

spaces: when people's lives are being controlled by extremists, from both sides. Maybe all we need to do is to respect and accept each other and to learn how to live together side by side. One side will keep certain modesty when around the other, while the second side will stop looking at women only as sexual objects and accept their right to be equal to men.

Looking at the IDF (Israel Defense Force), which is composed from a variety of publics in Israel, people are trying to find a solution that will please both sides. On one side, the IDF is operating special units that allow religious soldiers go through their entire service without seeing a woman around them.

That's the same organization that allows and even encourages women to be pilots, combat soldiers and every other role and rank they desire.

This bipolarity has existed in the IDF for several years, now having reached a boiling point – what should they do? Will they choose full separation or full mixture?



The Talmud, that vast compilation of Jewish law, commentary and midrash, has often been called a sea. The Babylonian Talmud, completed around 500 C.E., is the primary compilation of Jewish law and tradition, and became the basis for later legal codes that have governed traditional Jewish life ever since. The term "sea" is apt, as one can easily get lost in the byways of rabbinic discussion. One recent edition, published by Art Scroll, comes to 73 thick volumes.

Rabbi Stevens is preparing a class for beginners in Talmud. We will explore together selected texts – in English! – and together learn to follow Talmudic argument.

Our first class will be on Thursday, January 26, from 5:00 – 6:00 p.m., and continuing on most Thursdays at that hour. Classes will continue as long as there is interest; no prior swimming experience is necessary. Watch for details!


