NOSTRA AETATE AT 50

As I mentioned in a sermon last month, I love to mark anniversaries, especially when they provide an opportunity to make a Jewish connection. April's 150th anniversary of the end of the Civil War and President Lincoln's assassination prompted me to speak about Grant's order expelling all Jews – on 24 hours' notice – from all the territory in his military domain, and how a single Jew, Cesar Kaskel, took it upon himself to travel from Kentucky to Washington to seek an audience with Lincoln and convince Lincoln to rescind the order. Kaskel, who had only recently immigrated from Europe, is one of those great unsung heroes for religious freedom.

Another is Jules Isaac. Jules Isaac was a French Jew who survived the Holocaust. Convinced that anti-Semitism was rooted in Christian blame on Jews for the death of Jesus, he decided to devote the rest of his life to improving Jewish Christian relations – at a time when inter-faith dialogue was still almost completely unknown. Isaac founded a Paris-based study group of 60 Jews and Christians, the Amitié Judeo-Chrétienne, in 1947. Their studies

continued for years, and resolved to correct those “theologically inexact concepts and presentations of the Gospel” that taught that all Jews forever were contemptible and guilty of deicide. They concluded that such teachings were anti-Christian.

Jules Isaac then secured a meeting with Pope John XXIII, in 1960, when Isaac was 81; The Pope had just created a Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, and Isaac proposed that the Pope add a mandate to correct the historic injustice to the Jews.

The result, 50 years ago, was the *Nostra Aetate* [Latin: “In our time”], a key declaration by the Second Vatican Council. *Nostra Aetate* is the Catholic Church's first formal document on the relationship of the Church with non-Christian religions, particularly Judaism. It speaks of the bond between Christians and Jews, and states that blame for the death of Jesus cannot be laid upon the Jews. It explicitly rejects all acts and displays of anti-Semitism. The document is written with humility, and signaled a new starting point in the Church's relationship with Judaism.

The impact of *Nostra Aetate* has been profound, in both symbolic and very practical ways. Example: In

1992, on the 500th anniversary of the Edict of Expulsion of Jews from Spain, the Spanish Catholic Church apologized for its cruel act of 500 years earlier. More telling, the Church has taken active and public steps to dialogue with Jews, create teaching materials and condemn anti-Semitism in ways that we only wish had been the case during the Holocaust. Pope John Paul II became the first Pope to visit a synagogue in the whole history of the Catholic Church.

Anti-Semitic tracts like the *Protocols of the Elders of Zion*, proven a forgery more than a century ago, continue to circulate as fact throughout the Arab and Islamic world. Anti-Semitic acts of violence are at their highest levels in a generation. *Nostra Aetate* was a vital step in the right direction to stem this age-old hatred. Its remarkable story is known by far too few Christians and Jews. It recognized that the Jewish covenant with God for the land of Israel had not been broken, and stated that Christianity sprang from Jewish roots. This is an anniversary we can celebrate together, the 50th anniversary of *Nostra Aetate*, may it always be a legacy for the good.

FROM THE LIBRARY

For May we're going to highlight some of the music CDs we have in the temple library collection. CDs are located to the immediate right upon entering the library, second from top shelf.

Mamaloshen by Mandy Patinkin. A collection of traditional Yiddish songs and Yiddish translations of English songs by Jewish composers.

Planetary Jewish Music by The Fourth World. Using both contemporary and traditional instruments, this Philadelphia-based group "brings the eloquent power of North African, Balkan, and Middle Eastern Jewish roots music into the World Music scene."

The Radiance of Faith by Lauren Pomerantz. Pomerantz strives to combine art and science. This recording collects songs and poetry from Medieval Spain from Jewish, Arab, and Christian traditions.

Sing for Joy: Abayudaya Jews – Uganda. A collection of Ugandan Jewish music.

The Barry Sisters: Their Greatest Yiddish Hits and *The Barry Sisters Sing*. The Barry Sisters were popular American Klezmer and jazz entertainers whose career spanned from the late 1930s to early 1970s.

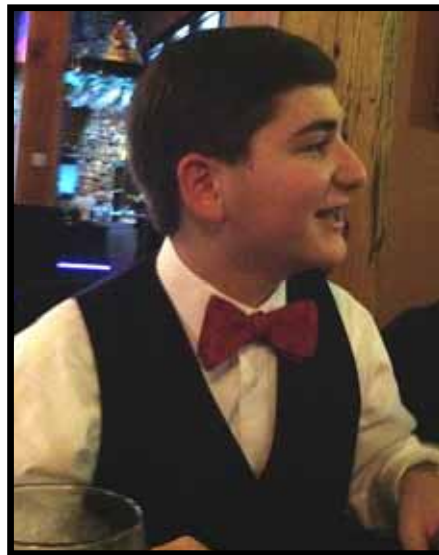

JOINT CONFIRMATION SET FOR MAY 17

Confirmation – the culminating service that celebrates our students’ completion of their formal religious education – is truly a celebration for the entire community. Here in Montgomery, our Confirmation class is a two-year program taught by both rabbis; our students benefit from hearing different perspectives on Jewish life and tradition, and our wide-ranging discussions are equally engaging for both students and rabbis.

Confirmation is a beautiful service, linked in season to Shavuot, the festival that traditionally makes the Revelation to Moses on Mt. Sinai. Students symbolically receive the Torah as their own, and confirm their own intention to involve themselves in Judaism as they enter adulthood.

This year’s service will be on **Sunday evening, May 17, at Agudath Israel * Etz Ahayem at 7 PM**. The service will be led by both rabbis, and co-led by soloist Turia Stark Williams; all four students in this year’s class will also participate: (L-R below) Nathan Ashner, Grant Lieberman, Sarah Claire Loeb and Zachary Mendelsohn. A reception will follow, and we look forward to having a GREAT turnout from our entire community.



RABBI STEVENS OFFERS COURSE IN JEWISH SEXUAL VALUES

Our Jewish tradition has much to teach us about sexual ethics and sexual behavior. Contemporary issues including birth control, abortion, homosexuality, pre-marital and extra-marital sex as well as many others are reflected in Jewish texts, often in surprising, even astonishing ways. This course includes explicit discussions and texts, and is rated “R.”

Barak Levy, Shaliach ● Lag B'Omer

Lag B'Omer is one of the "New Israeli-Jewish Holidays" and we will celebrate it all over Israel on the evening of Wednesday, May 6 and it will end by the evening of Thursday, May 7. So what is "Lag B'Omer"? and why we are doing it?

Counting of the “Omer” is an important verbal counting of each of the forty-nine days between the Jewish holidays of Passover and Shavuot. Lag B'Omer, the 33rd day of the Omer count is a festive day on the Jewish calendar. “Lag” is based on the number 33 – the numerical equivalent of 33 is *lamed gimel*, which can be read as “lag.” Lag B'Omer traditionally is attributed to Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, whom kabbalists teach is the author of the “Zohar.” According to Jewish tradition, Rabbi Shimon hid in a cave for thirteen years studying the Torah and was inspired by the Prophet Elijah to write the Zohar. Rabbi Shimon, who lived in the second century of the Common Era, apparently was the first to publicly teach the mystical dimen-

sion of the Torah known as the “Kabbalah.” On the day of his passing, Rabbi Shimon instructed his disciples to mark the date as “the day of my joy.” So each Lag B'Omer, we celebrate Rabbi Shimon’s life and the revelation of the esoteric soul of Torah.

It is celebrated with outings on which the children traditionally play with bows and arrows, bonfires, and other joyous events. As a kid, I remember myself looking for wood all over town along with my best friends. We were so happy, it was the best time of the year for us kids to work together and manage a big event of our own just for us. We knew that we would stay awake all night near the bonfire, cooking meat on the "Mangal" (Means: Barbeque). We would tell stories and sing songs with acoustic guitar.

Just from traveling around town you will see families and school kids having a bonding time to communicate and leave all our daily concerns behind. Al-

so, many adults visit the resting place of the great sage and mystic Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai in Meron (Northern Israel) for the anniversary of his passing that is on this day.



We still don't celebrate Lag B'Omer here in Montgomery, but it doesn't mean we cannot enjoy this unique Israeli holiday in our Jewish homes. It's time for us to get together and enjoy each other. Make plans for dinner, play with the kids or hang with friends but don't miss this beautiful Israeli-Jewish Holiday.

We need your help in order to offer ours.

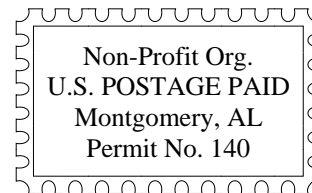
