LAWRENCE HOFFMAN TO SPEAK AT TEMPLE BETH OR! Thursday, February 12 at 7 PM



One of my fondest sayings – as I'm sure you've heard – is what Adam said to Eve as they were leaving the Garden of Eden: "We are living in an age of transition." This is a truism, of course, for all ages, including ours – in terms of science and technology; international relations; the social and political spheres...and in American Judaism.

One of the foremost scholars, authors and commentators on the American Jewish scene is my teacher, Dr. Lawrence Hoffman. He, more than almost any other Jewish thinker, has charted and inspired the "ages of transition" of the American Jewish experience. And he is coming to Montgomery this month to speak here, at Temple Beth Or!

Having worked closely with Dr. Hoffman – one of Judaism's top scholars of Jewish liturgy and ritual – on most of the Reform Movement's liturgical publications over more than 30 years, including our new prayer book – **I have been looking for an occasion to bring him to us. This being my 40th year in the rabbinate (!), I finally extended the invite, and have been working with the Institute for Southern Jewish life to arrange a tour for him in other southern communities.**

Dr. Hoffman is just about the most brilliant, insightful, engaging and cogent speaker I have heard, and I am thrilled that he will be with us. This is truly an event that I hope everyone in our community will attend.

His topic will be: "Limits, Truth and Meaning: The Anxious Search for Meaning in our Time." In describing his choice of topic, Dr. Hoffman notes that Judaism has known three revolutions in thought: the first, some 2000 years ago,

gave us rabbinic Judaism and an emphasis on limits. The second, just 200 years ago, gave us Reform Judaism and the centrality of truths. We are living through the third revolution now, he writes, and with it, the anxious search for meaning in our lives. His lecture will chart these three revolutions emphasizing our own and the reason meaning has become so important for us today. It's a very appropriate topic for our time and our situation here in Montgomery.

By way of further background, let me append some notes from his bio:

"Dr. Lawrence A. Hoffman was ordained as a rabbi in 1969, received his Ph.D. in 1973, and has taught since then at the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion, in New York, where he also directed its School of Sacred Music. He teaches classes in liturgy, ritual, spirituality, theology and synagogue leadership. For almost forty years, he has combined research, teaching, and a passion for the spiritual renewal of North American Judaism.

Rabbi Hoffman has written or edited over forty books, including *My People's Prayer Book* (Jewish Lights Publishing), a ten-volume edition of the Siddur with modern commentaries, which was named a National Jewish Book Award winner for 2007. His *Rethinking Synagogues: A New Vocabulary for Congregational Life* (Jewish Lights Publishing) and his *Art of Public Prayer* (Skylight Paths) are widely used by churches and synagogues as guides to organizational visioning and liturgical renewal. In 2011, he received a second National Jewish Book Award for co-authoring *Sacred Strategies: Transforming Synagogues from Functional to Visionary* (Alban Institute).

His articles, both popular and scholarly, have appeared in eight languages and four continents, and include contributions to such encyclopedias as *The Macmillan*

Encyclopedia of Religion, The Oxford Dictionary of Religion, The Encyclopedia of Judaism and The Encyclopedia of Religion in America. He syndicates a regular column which appears, among other places, in *The Jewish Week* and *The Jewish Times*.

For many years, Rabbi Hoffman served as visiting professor of the University of Notre Dame, and has lectured at conferences and academic settings in many countries. He is a past-president of the North American Academy of Liturgy, and received that organization's award for outstanding lifetime contributions to his field.

In 1994, he co-founded "Synagogue 2000," a trans-denominational project to envision the ideal synagogue "as moral and spiritual center" for the 21st century. As Synagogue 3000, it has launched Next Dor, a national initiative to engage the next generation through a relational approach featuring strong communities with transformed synagogues at their center.

CIVIL RIGHTS SCHOLAR TO SPEAK AT TEMPLE MARCH 19


The Temple Beth Or Library Lecture Series, sponsored by the Rothschild-Blachschleger Library Fund, is proud to present Dr. J. Mills Thornton III, who will speak here in conjunction with this year's observance of the 50th anniversary of the bus boycott and the Voting Rights march from Selma to Montgomery. The program will take place on March 19 at 7:00 p.m. in the Baylinson Social Hall.

Dr. Thornton, a native Alabamian, was on the history faculty at the University of Michigan from 1974 to 2010, and recently returned to Montgomery.

His 1980 article "Challenge and Response in the Montgomery Bus Boycott of 1955-1956," published in *The Alabama Review*, was later expanded into a book: *Dividing Lines: Municipal Politics and the Struggle for Civil Rights in*

Montgomery, Birmingham and Selma (Tuscaloosa 2002). The book was honored in 2003 with the Organization of American Historians' Liberty Legacy Foundation Award. His first book was *Politics and Power in a Slave Society: Alabama, 1800 – 1860*. The January 1914 issue of *the Alabama Review* devoted its entire issue to a career perspective on this extraordinary historian.

Dr. Thornton is a renowned scholar and speaker, and we hope that many will attend this important program, and bring your guests as well.



Over the last few months, Louisa Weinrib has been reading for fun and enlightenment one of the huge old volumes of minutes from our temple's history. She shares the following interesting tidbits:

- January 13, 1901 at the Annual Meeting Rabbi A. J. Messing reported there are 125 students in Sabbath School. The members are building a new Temple for \$50,000, and have also contributed to the Jewish Orphans' Home in New Orleans, the Home for Consumptives in Denver, and to Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati.
- June 6, 1902 Kahl Montgomery's Golden Jubilee celebration with the dedication of the new temple at the corner of Sayre and Clayton Streets. There was extensive coverage in the local newspaper, testimonials from visiting dignitaries, music, and the viewing of the art glass memorial windows. Master Lucien Loeb presented the "perpetual lamp" and recited the first 3 verses of Genesis, and Lottie Greil presented a golden key to the temple to President David Weil on behalf of the children.
- January 11, 1903. Pew owners or pew renters who have the habit of expectorating shall be required to apply to the Board of Administration for cuspidors to be placed in their pews at their expense.
- June 15, 1906 Rabbi Messing resigned after 9 years, and was succeeded by Dr. Bernard C. Ehrenrich, who served until 1921. The minutes reflect, that though beloved by the membership and community, he was at

odds with the Board over many issues, e.g. his Camp Kawaga for boys in the northwoods of Wisconsin (ed. note: attended for many summers by my father.), his chaplaincy to Jewish soldiers at Camp Sheridan, a U.S. Army National Guard mobilization and training camp on the north side of Montgomery 1917-19, and his desire to publish a congregational bulletin and to teach advanced Hebrew. These disputes went on and on for years, ending only when Rabbi Ehrenrich left Montgomery. It is interesting that in the early 1930s, Mrs. Ehrenrich left a nice bequest to Kahl Montgomery.



- January 13, 1907 At the Annual Meeting Rabbi Ehrenrich's first message concerned changes to the Sabbath School, and a call to the congregation to prepare for an expected influx of immigrants from Russia through the port of Galveston.
- April 5, 1914 \$100 was appropriated in case it was needed to aid in completing the Orthodox Synagogue
- January 16, 1918 At the Annual Meeting, President David Weil said that our country is at war with the country of birth of many members, and every Jew is loyal to the U.S. Members have chaired civic drives for the War effort - Liberty Bonds, Red Cross, hospitality for soldiers at Camp Sheridan, fuel for the poor, etc.

Tu B'shvat - Barak Levy, Shaliach

On February 4th we are celebrating Tu B'shvat, the Jewish New Year for the trees. This holiday is one of the most interesting holidays that we have as a Jewish people.

All of this day is devoted to the value of protection and appreciation for our environment. The world is changing fast and in Israel as in any Western country the environment gets hurt by pollution and trash that we humans make.

Every year on this specific day a lot of projects such as recycling, cleaning and planting trees take place all over Israel. This year, we have a "Sh'mita year." We are in the seventh year of the seven-year agricultural cycle mandated by the Torah for the Land of Israel and still observed it in our days. During a "Sh'mita year," the land is left to lie

fallow and all agricultural activity, including plowing, planting, pruning and harvesting, is forbidden by "halakha" (Jewish law). Other cultivation techniques (such as watering, fertilizing, weeding, spraying, trimming and mowing) may be performed as a preventative measure only, not to improve the growth of trees or other plants. Therefore this year there will be no planting, but a lot of trips.

Many people will travel all over the country, enjoying the fresh air and the green all around. They will help with cleaning the country we love and protect so much or just explore interesting nature places in Israel especially in the north of the country that offers lovely forests and amazing landscapes.

This holiday shows that the Jewish people knows and always knew that the future of our planet is important and that we

are willing to keep the world green and clean. We need to be grateful for the land that gives us so much. We need to keep and take care of our planet for our future and for the future of the ones who will come after us.

Together we can make the change and make this world a clean and better place.


