Have you ever had the experience during a time of heartbreaking loss to count your blessings of ever having known the person you now mourn? To feel your sadness equals your admiration, respect and love?

In 2007 during a thorough rabbinic search, there was a lucky coincidence, or perhaps divine intervention, when we were introduced to two delightful life-long New Yorkers. Rabbi Elliot Stevens and his wife, Sandy Lynn, took a chance on us and arrived in Montgomery - he as the new Rabbi for Temple Beth Or - in July 2007. It was the beginning of a beautiful relationship, but one that was much too brief.

Rabbi Elliot Stevens immersed himself in his work here as a full time Rabbi. He loved the work and, though it could be demanding with long hours, he never complained and was always trying to grow and improve for our benefit. His former position for many years had been at the CCAR, Central Conference of American Rabbis, and he had always had a part-time pulpit, but Montgomery was a new adventure in a totally new environment. Elliot – so down to earth he always asked people to call him by his first name – was a soft-spoken, warm, erudite man with many wonderful characteristics who was instrumental in helping Temple Beth Or evolve and strengthen as we met the challenges of a small Jewish congregation.

Elliot was quiet and reserved with a very dry sense of humor, was quite funny, but one had to be quick and paying attention to catch his jokes. He was possessed of a calm and peaceful manner, and if he was ever angry, he was a master at not showing it. He was kind, patient and thoughtful - someone who would never intentionally hurt

another person. Even when he was critically ill he would ask about others' illnesses. Rabbis are human and therefore have faults like everyone, but Elliot had fewer than many of us. He had tremendous integrity, and if he was ever told something in confidence it never left his lips. Elliot was completely trustworthy.

Rabbi Stevens LOVED to teach, and he was extremely knowledgeable on a wide variety of subjects. He taught at Huntingdon College, adult education classes at Temple, Shabbat morning Torah study, confirmation classes, b'nei mitzvah students – he especially enjoyed working with the children – and was available whenever a group asked him.

For those who worked with him it was known that he was always prepared, and if asked for information then he most likely had it ready that afternoon; definitely the next day. He was creative, forward thinking and often suggested programs, speakers or ideas to educate and entertain us. If Elliot ever came to the Board with a problem, he also came prepared with one or more solutions. He did not avoid difficult or uncomfortable situations that needed to be dealt with; rather met them head on with respect and graciousness. He welcomed and encouraged others to participate in services and gladly shared his pulpit. He was open to suggestions and ideas, but it was he who usually had the new idea. Elliot was musical, and the positive influence of that knowledge and interest cannot be overstated. He was responsible for Temple Beth Or having its first cantorial student, and that experience has had a tremendous impact.

Elliot worked on behalf of Temple Beth Or, but he was committed to the

entire Jewish community and worked to strengthen the relationship with our neighbors at Agudath Israel-Etz Ahayem. He was very involved with the Jewish Federation and spent a great deal of time with the many shlichim who were here from Israel. Elliot was a strong supporter of Civil Justice issues and of Israel.

He became involved and represented us well in the Montgomery community by serving on several boards, working to revitalize Interfaith Montgomery, building relationships with other clergy and doing outreach through his adult education series.

Elliot was devoted to his family and often spoke with pride about children and grandchildren. Simply put, Sandy Lynn was the love of his life and they were fortunate to have such a special, loving relationship. In recent years, they had discovered the joy of playing golf together. Elliot was quite open that he was not so good at it, certainly not as proficient as Sandy Lynn, but he loved playing, being outside in beautiful surroundings and working to improve his game.

There is so much more that could be said. It all comes down to the fact that Rabbi Elliot Stevens was admired, respected and loved. He will be greatly missed, not only as the Rabbi of Temple Beth Or, but as our friend. He touched many lives during his 10 years in Montgomery and we are better for having had the honor and pleasure of knowing him.





