Dear beloved congregation,

After Adam and Eve eat from the forbidden fruit, they attempt to hide from God. It is futile in that the eating of the fruit has implanted conscience in humanity. God, wandering in the garden, calls out to Adam, "where are you?" Suddenly lost, Adam's response is not one of physical position. Rather, it is an expression of one who knows they have done wrong, yet is not quite ready to accept responsibility. The same for Eve. Each blame an other. Adam, Eve. Eve, the serpent. In reality, the story of Adam and Eve is repeated every day by us. The episode in Eden is unique only in its particulars. We hide, Charlie Brown-like. We are seen, still hoping that our misdeeds, past and present, remain hidden. Yet, as for Adam and Eve. so for us. We are imbued with a conscience, a knowledge of right and wrong. We may try to hide our actions from others, but our conscience speaks to us. However, we do not always listen well to that voice. It hurts us to be less than perfect.

When God calls out to Adam, God already knows where Adam is, physically and morally. God knows that Adam, like a child, is hiding, hoping not to be caught, to be disciplined. God, however, knows something of which Adam and Eve have just become aware; they are imperfect.

We are not always good. We

are not always "at our best." We are not always truthful, with




ourselves and towards others. We are not always kind, forgiving, humble, and just. We cannot be. Nonetheless, this does not grant us carte blanche to act without concern for the consequences and repercussions of our actions. It is our obligation, seeing ourselves as a reflection of the Divine, to find our hidden selves, to be honest, to answer that question: "Where are you?"

Just as Adam and Eve became lost in the Garden of Eden, during these past ten months of physical separation from one another, focused as many of us are on our own needs, pains, and sorrows, our own ideas and ideals, our own expectations, and beliefs, we too may have become lost. Recovery of self and place, however, is still possible. I envision this quiet time, this time of being lost in familiar surroundings, as an opportunity to find our way back towards the representation of Eden. That journey is an individual one, one that is necessary in order to find our way back to the Divine sense of self, and to one another.



The opening chapter of Getting Good at Getting Older is is entitled: Changing Your Life for (the) Good. Its focus centers on mussar, a Hebrew term that means "instruction, correction, or ethics." As the book details, "everyone has 'soul traits' (middot), such as humility, patience, honor, enthusiasm, and

generosity, but each of us possesses those traits in different measures." Our work will entail practicing one middah (one character trait) each week. We begin by considering the middah: defining it, measuring its prevalence in our life, and then, focusing on it for a week, endeavoring to reinforce it within and exemplify it outwardly. One may choose to journal, and/ or work with a study-partner; chevruta – studying with a partner – is the quintessential mode of Jewish study.

Over the next couple of months, as we work through the middot, I will setup monthly Zoom meetings (morning and evening) for open discussion. All those who wish to participate are welcome. This, I see, as a sharing of wisdom. However, it is not required. In general, it will be helpful for me to know who is engaging in the initial mussar activity. Moreover, the Zoom meeting info will be protected and sent only to self-identified participants.
